Moore's Chapel Homecoming Service

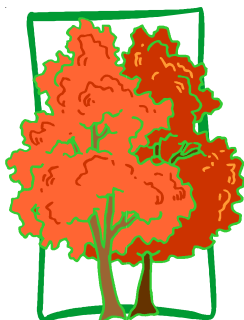

**Let's share our
burden together!**

Moore's Chapel, as family of God, has faithfully served God in Blake for the last 138 years. We obeyed God's vision for the next generations to build a building and faithfully again showed our financial commitment for the Underwood Educational Building that is at an estimated cost of 1.5 million dollars. Since February 2005, many families committed to first and second pledge campaign, along with many fundraisers. As of August 31, 2010 –more than \$900,000 has been paid off. I believe this is a miracle of God for Moore's Chapel. I want to say thank you to the Moore's Chapel family for the financial commitment they showed for the last five years.

However, an inevitable result of stretching ourselves for the building fund under these economic conditions, we now are wrestling with the operating budget.

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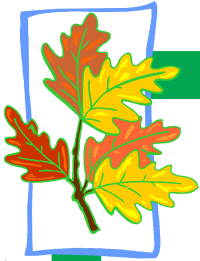

There is more than \$20,000 projected deficit for the operating budget as of August 31 and this has limited our mission and ministry.

We are now facing a large financial obstacle and we are at the point that we have to do something drastic to get past this crisis.

From the time I realized our financial difficulties, I have been praying for this issue before God. I don't believe this is business just for a few lay leaders, or the administrative council members or our treasurer Kenny or just pastor. As a family in faith we all have to know how serious our financial status is, should be concerned and pray together, and need to share the burden together, too. As your spiritual leader, I would like to introduce 4 different approaches to overcoming the financial difficulty before us.

First, there is a passive way, we cut our current spending. We can save money by spending less; reduce our routine expenses or postpone any activities or events that demand money. In fact, we already have been doing this after we acquired the debt for our building project. Each committee and ministry is on a minimum budget. The church staff's salary has mostly been kept the same. I don't believe any of the current church staff is overpaid compared with other churches. These methods are effective only for limited time.

The second way out of our financial difficulty is an active way, we try to earn more money. We can make more money through various fundraising events. Even though we had and are involved in successful fundraisers, we can do more on a regular basis. For example, we can serve luncheons or dinners for our church family and community once a month such as a Spaghetti Dinner, a Family Pizza Night, or perhaps a Taste of Italy. We can help the operating budget by changing the fundraising priority; we can temporarily use every fundraiser only for the operating budget; not only the proceeds from our current fundraiser (golf tournament, church yard sale, tag-day breakfast, pig-beef roast) but also the proceeds from youth, UMM, UMW or new fundraisers, too, until our financial situation stabilizes. Or, we can rent our new facility to the public more aggressively.

Third, there is an extreme or radical way to solve this financial crisis. We can change the fundamental structure of the church in a drastic way; For example, we sell the church property (we need to have property to sell first for this option!); Or if

we have a retired pastor or a student pastor (one who still is in seminary), or a local pastor (a pastor who hasn't gone to seminary), rather than a full time pastor like me, we would save half of the current pastor's compensation immediately. Or, if we change every staff position from paying to a volunteer position, that will also be a big savings. This looks like a very attractive option mathematically but this would be a serious risk and maybe would bring worst consequences. In my opinion this would be regressive, not progressive.

Lastly, we have the enthusiastic way, we can show a greater financial commitment and stewardship. Even though we have faithfully contributed our tithes, to the building fund and the regular offering, we can encourage each other in faith and evaluate again our financial priorities and commitment. Certainly this is the most demanding and painful way for all of us, however, I believe this is the most faith-based and compassionate way to solve our financial difficulty.

Some of you probably are not comfortable hearing this last option that encourages more giving to solve the lack in the church's operating budget. "Pastor, God ask too much. I think I have given my portion before God. Don't push me hard to give more. I don't have any money to give." I understand your financial difficulty and I perceive that our country is in a recession; Yes, everyone is in difficulty, many of us are having a tough time, and some of us are in desperate financial straits. I don't want to be a motivation speaker who touches people's emotions or a tax collector who forcefully squeezes people to contribute more money. But I have to plea once again, "Let's share our burden together!" Not because we have to do it as a responsibility of membership, but because we are family and we love God and Moore's Chapel dearly.

I want to share with you a short story that always speaks to me whenever I am struggling with the issue of money. The title is "How much to give?" "Go give to the needy sweet charity's bread. For giving is living," the angel said. "And must I be giving again and again?" My immature answer ran. "Oh, no," said the angel, piercing me through, "Just give till the Master stops giving to you." If we are really smart mathematically, we always remember this, "Give according to your income, lest God make your income according to your giving."

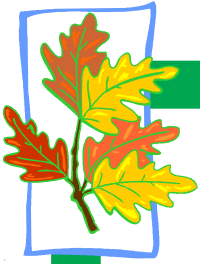
*What is God's will for my life?

I'm a Little Tea Cup



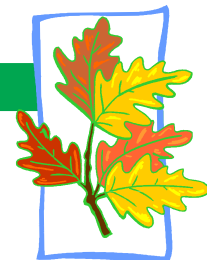
There was a couple who took a trip to England to shop in a beautiful antique store to celebrate their 25th wedding anniversary. They both liked antiques and pottery, and especially teacups. Spotting an exceptional cup, they asked “May we see that? We’ve never seen a cup quite so beautiful.” As the lady handed it to them, suddenly the teacup spoke, “You don’t understand. I have not always been a teacup. There was a time when I was just a lump of red clay. My master took me and rolled me, pounded and patted me over and over and I yelled out, “Don’t do that. I don’t like it! Let me alone,” but he only smiled, and gently said, “Not yet.”

Then WHAM! I was placed on a spinning wheel and suddenly I was made to suit him and then he put me in the oven. I never felt such heat. I yelled and knocked and pounded at the door. “Help! Get me out of here!” I could see him through the opening and I could read his lips as he shook his head from side to side, “Not yet.” When I thought I couldn’t bear it another minute, the door opened. He carefully took me out and put me on the shelf, and I began to cool. Oh, that felt so good! “Ah, this is much better,” I thought. But, after I cooled he picked me up and he brushed and painted me all over. The fumes were horrible. I thought I would gag. “Oh, please, stop it, stop, I cried.” He only shook his head and said, “Not yet.”

Then suddenly he puts me back in to the oven. Only it was not like the first one. This was twice as hot and I just knew I would suffocate. I begged. I pleaded. I screamed. I cried. I was convinced I would never make it. I was ready to give up. Just then the door opened and he took me out and again placed me on the shelf, where I cooled and waited and waited, wondering, “What’s he going to do to me next?” An hour later he handed me a mirror and said, “Look at yourself.” And I did. I said, “That’s not me. That couldn’t be me. It’s beautiful. I’m beautiful!”

Quietly he spoke: “I want you to remember. I know it hurt to be rolled and pounded and patted, but had I just left you alone, you’d have dried up. He will mold us and make us and expose us to just enough pressures of just the right kinds that we may be made into a flawless piece of work to fulfill His good, pleasing and perfect Will. So when life seems hard, and you are being pounded and patted and pushed almost beyond endurance; when your world seems to be spinning out of control; when you feel like you are in a fiery furnace of trials; when life seems to “stink”, try this: Brew a cup of your favorite tea in your prettiest tea cup, or coffee, sit down and think on this story and then, have a little talk with the Potter.

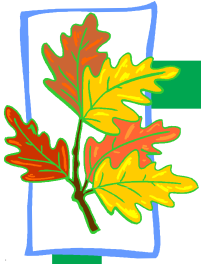

 Why Jesus loves someone like me.



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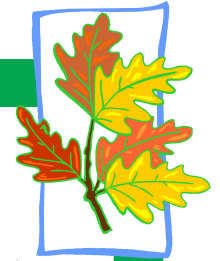
